

Ya didn't have to be 80 to enjoy choir

It was a bit like cleaning out the refrigerator - last night's casserole, a bit of something wrapped in foil, left over vegetables meant for soup or stew, and the remains of mom's delicious banana cream pie.

However, conductor David Wikman called it "Ya' Gotta Be 80," the season finate for the Muskegon Chamber Choir. The 36-member choir performed at St. Mary's church to a good-size and enthusiastic audience Saturday evening.

The idea was to put in place a collection of chestnuts, mostly, that are seldom, if ever, programmed these days utilizing full choir, ensembles and soloists. This reviewer found it wasn't necessary to be 80 to enjoy the varied fare however. The program contained folk songs, pop selections (old and older), some Stephen Foster, and, presumably, some favorites of individual choir members.

Space doesn't allow us to review all 25 selections, but here are some of the highlights. The full choir opened with three Stephen Foster songs. The arrangements were excellent and maintained the honest simplicity of Fos-

ter's intentions. The singers displayed good balance and musical phrasing. The tenor section sound was exceptional with a pleasing purity of tone and on-the-button pitch.

The Gail Kubik arrangement of "Annie Laurie" and the Vaclay Nelhybel handling of "All Through the Night" brought new dimensions to these thoroughly familiar works. The Nelhybel employed the women's sections of the choir with soloists Denise Neweil and Cynthia Twining. It was one of the high points in the concert. The other was Ed Lojeski's arrangement of Duke Ellington's "Mood Indigo." another selection for women with Twining as

The Ralph Hunter/Robert Shaw and the Alice Parker/Robert Shaw choral arrangements aren't programmed often any longer. The men's ensemble performed four from this repertoire. Although there were some ambiguous pitches in the basses and baritones at times, the success of these arrangements still was apparent – well crafted and musical. Bradley Taylor and Dana Olsen were the featured soloists.

The unmistakable Fred Waring choral style was evident in the arrangement of Hoagy Carmichael's "Stardust." And, although that's a style long past, this writer finds a comfort level developed in his youth from listening to the weekly radio shows of Waring's Pennsylvanians.

Anita Kerr displayed wit and whimsey in her arrangement of "Singin' in the Rain" for women. And would any pops choral program be complete without a Harry Simeone, predictable arrangement? This time "Alexander's Ragtime Band."

Either the audience was anxious to get home or they thoroughly enjoyed the evening was made evident by the sudden leap to feet at evening's end.
