Forty Years and Counting


The Muskegon Chamber Choir was formed by its present Music Director as a sixteen-voice ensemble in the fall of 1963. Its first concert was presented in April of 1964.

It members come from all walks of life. There are teachers, accountants, doctors, nurses, salespeople, and service providers singing side by side. At one time a member of the United States Coast Guard sang next to a heavy equipment operator. All of these singers share one common love; that of singing great choral music together. Membership is by audition only with regular reauditions.

Two hundred forty seven singers have sung with the choir since its founding. Each has brought to it a tender, patient devotion to the choral art. We are proud to number Richard Versalle, Gwenneth Bean, and Robert Lehner among our past members. Our greatest source of pride, however, can be found in the personnel lists of forty years' worth of programs - those singers who have brought their love of choral music to rehearsals and concerts year in and year out. Some appear on only one program. Others are almost fixtures on the page.

Over the years the choir has performed a number of choral/orchestral works. Among them are the Mass in b minor and Magnificat of J.S. Bach, Messiah and the Dettingen Te Deum of Handel, The Creation by Haydn: Mozart's Requiem and smaller masses, Elijah of Mendelssohn, and numerous cantatas of Bach. The biennial Wreath of Carols has become a community musical tradition, as has the annual Love Songs concert in February.

The press has called the choir "... a valuable community resource," and one critic said, "... hearing it was like being hit with a diamond-studded steam roller.



ynthia Bates Twining, a Muskegon native, has been performing on West Michigan stages for over 30 years.

A graduate of Muskegon Community and Hope Colleges, she received her Bachelor's degree in vocal music education with postgraduate work at Western Michigan University.

Perhaps best known for her musical theater work, she has just completed her tenth season with Cherry County Playhouse. Last year she appeared in Muskegon Civic Theater's Quilters, was soloist with the West Shore Symphony Orchestra's Peer Gynt, and was soprano soloist in Artfam's production of Haydn's The Creation. Her very first classical solo role was in Messiah in 1975, where she met her husband, Clark.

Cynthia fills her "spare" time teaching privately, judging Michigan School Vocal Music Association festivals, serving on the Mona Shores High School Choir Board, traveling with the Mona Shores choir, and enjoying her children and grandchildren

Mrs. Twining's appearance is underwritten by Kenneth and Shirley Brown.

Steven Rickards has received international acclaim as one of America's finest countertenors. He is the first countertenor to receive a Master of Music degree in vocal performance from Indiana University. He has studied in England on a Fulbright-Hayes Scholarship.

Mr. Rickards' schedule of performances has included appearances with Chicago's Music of the Baroque and Basically Bach, the Los Angeles Master Chorale, His Majesty's Clerkes, Toronto's Tafelmusik, Chanticleer, London's Gabrieli Consort, and the Symphony Orchestras of St. Louis, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, and Virginia. In addition to London, he has appeared as soloist in Dresden, Oslo, Frankfurt, Wroclaw, and Copenhagen. He performed the Bach St. John Passion in Regensberg, Munich, and Brixen in 1977. He has also appeared with Boston's Handel & Haydn Society singing Messiah.

He made his Mostly Mozart Festival debut in Bach's Mass in B minor. He has performed Messiah in many major American cities as well as at St. Martin-in-the-Field in London. He made his Australian debut in Brisbane with New York's Ensemble for Early Music in Daniel and the Lions to sell-out crowds and rave reviews.

Steven Rickards' discography includes: Bach's Cantatas 8, 106, 131, 156, St. John Passion, and Mass in B minor, Handel's Siroe and Messiah, and a collection of cantatas for The Buxtehude project.

Watson holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Carthage College, with additional study at the American Conservatory of Music and the American Institute of Musical Studies in Graz. Austria.

He has performed with Lyric Opera of Chicago, most recently creating the role of President Van Buren in the world premiere of Amistad by Anthony Davis. He has performed with Cleveland Opera, Chicago Opera Theater, Palm Beach Opera, Texas Opera Theater, Pennsylvania Opera Theater, and Central City Opera. In Europe, he sang for two seasons at the Aachen Stadttheater in Germany. He has also been heard at the San Sebastian Festival in Spain, the Europera Festival in France, and in Klagenfurt, Austria.

He has been guest soloist with major symphony orchestras throughout the USA and Canada, including those in Chicago, St. Louis, Montreal, Milwaukee, Cincinnati, and Rochester with such conductors as Sir Georg Solti, Leonard Slatkin, Jesus Lopez-Cobos, Hugh Wolf, Lukas Foss, Mark Elder, and Charles Dutoit.

Watson continues to develop his reputation as one of America's finest Bach Evangelists. St. Matthew performances include the Alabama Symphony, Buffalo Philharmonic, Winter Park Bach Festival, Albany Pro Musica, The Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony in Ontario and his Netherlands debut with the Noord Nederlands Orkest.

Watson can be heard on the London Records St. Matthew Passion with the Chicago Symphony conducted by Sir Georg Solti. He also appears on Where're You Walk (English Händel Arias) and on a recent release of Vorisek's Mass in B flat with the Czech National Symphony.

Robert Lehner is a native of Muskegon and an alumnus of the Chamber Choir. He is very happy to return to Muskegon to perform with his many friends from the choir.

Since moving to Chicago to study with Thomas Wikman, Mr. Lehner has performed with the Lyric Opera Chorus, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra Chorus, and Music of the Baroque.

As a soloist, Robert has performed with Music of the Baroque, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, the West Shore Symphony Orchestra, the University of Chicago Chorale, and in a very special performance of *To Hope*, with the Milwaukee Symphony and Dave Brubeck, the composer.

Recently, in a departure from the classical music field, Rob released a CD entitled My Old Home, a recording of songs he wrote and performed. The music is described as Urban Folk Style.
